
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Message from the President



Water & WASH Projects

To make rural communities Open Defecation (ODF) Free and improvement in hygiene practices through handwashing, the WASH component was implemented under Accelerated Action Plan (AAP), Local Government Department, Government of Sindh, through Implementation Partners was designed on Community Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) approach. In this approach, through a process of participatory facilitation, community members analyzed their own sanitation situation, including the extent of open defecation and the spread of contamination through it that adversely affects each one of them. Once people are convinced about the need of sanitation, communities mobilize to construct latrines on their own at the household level, according to their own capacity, and more importantly use it regularly with strong sense of ownership.

The approach also believes that the choice of sanitation technology has to come from people using the latrines in view of their affordability and ground situations. This all needs a behavior change campaign for not only the use of sanitary toilets but also for hand washing with soap at critical times.

Education Projects

Educating the Uneducated

The Adult Literacy and Numeracy Skill- Non Formal Education project started in July 2021 to May 2022 to complete the learning of package A. The overall objective of the project is to educate 12,100 female learners 3,700 in Sujawal, 2,800 in Tando Muhammad Khan, 2,600 in Tando Allahyar and 3,000 in Matiari districts of Sindh, Province of Pakistan. The duration of course of Package A is eight (08) months of learning period. The learning course is on 3Rs (read, write and arithmetic) utilizing the Package-A developed by Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and recognized by the Directorate of Non-Formal Education & Literacy Department, Government of Sindh. The project established 484 Adult Literacy and Numeracy Centers ((ALNs) 148 in Sujawal, 112 in Tando Muhammad Khan, 104 in Tando Allahyar and 120 in Matiari districts of Sindh Province of Pakistan.

She is a Member of the Sindh Provincial Assembly and the Chairperson of the Standing Committee on Higher, Technical Education and Research, School Education and Special Education. All ALNS Centers are supported by EU through NRSP and jointly implemented by MDF & SZABIST.







On 20th of December 2021, MDF Project team organized inauguration ceremony of the two ALNS Centers at village Ghulam Joya 1 & 2 of District Matiari. The guest of honor was Mr. Makhdom Fakhar Zaman, Ex-Chairman District Council Matiari.





Management and Operation of Public Schools by Education Management Organizations (EMO) in Sindh

To overcome the obstacles in providing quality teaching and efficient operation and management of model primary schools, the School Education & Literacy Department, Government of Sindh desires to outsource the management and administration of selected Package(s) of public sector schools in Sindh to Education Management Organizations (EMOs) in a manner that such public schools will be managed and run by these EMOs on a public-private partnership basis, under the public private partnership (PPP) Act (the Project).

Management and Development Foundation (MDF) in Joint Venture with Shaheed Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto Institute of Science and Technology (SZABIST) and Management and Development Center (MDC) have been awarded the project for 10 years covering 10 schools in



Jacobabad and Kashmore districts of Sindh Province of Pakistan. The Project is an important part of the Government's strategy towards developing education sector and enhancing the literacy rate.

ILMPOSSIBLE- Take a Child to School (TACS-II)

The project has been implemented in Badin, Naushahro Feroz and Dadu Districts of Sindh Province of Pakistan, with the support from British Council (BC) since 2015. MDF implemented the project in Badin since 2015 and later extended district Naushahro Feroz and Dadu districts.

To create an enabling environment for school enrollment through running an enrollment and retention campaign by implementing the effective mobilization framework devised by British Council to engage young volunteers and communities in Sindh province. The TAC-II Project was completed in May 2021.

Success Story of Miss Farzana Bhatti: She become a TACS-II volunteer in 2019, during volunteers' identification a TACS-II team member met with Ms. Farzana Bhatti and told her about TACS-II project and its aim. She became inspire from the aim of TACS-II project and become agreed to join the TACS-II project as a volunteer. She attended capacity building training in 2019. During the training



she learned volunteerism and how to get the out of school children enrolled in primary schools. She conducted household survey and identified many Out of School Children around her community, she enrolled many children to her neighborhood schools.

Farzana Bhatti didn't stop there but she also become the part of Ilm-Summit 2019 at Islamabad. She voluntarily took part in many of the activities of TACS-II project. She continued her struggle with hard work, although she is in a private job but she also keep in touch with TACS-II team of district Naushahro Feroz and committed to continue with her struggle for out of school children.

Adolescent and Adult Learning and Training Program

Since 2017, with the support of Sindh Education Foundation (SEF), two Adolescent and Adult Learning and Training Program (AALTP) centers have been established in district Dadu. The Adults are provided with 6 months course on 3R i.e. Read, Write and Arithmetic and the module of SEF is utilized. After completion of 6 months course, the Adults are provided Skill Development Training. After the completion of initial 6 months of learning course, the new batch of Adults was identified. The new batch of Adults were provided trainings on 3Rs and then the Skill Development Course. In 24 months, at least 2 batches of Adults can be trained through this AALTP initiative. The regular attendance and retention of learners is mandatory for the program. Project has trained more than 1,000 adults and adolescent through AALTP inventiveness.

PATHWAYS – EDGE Programme/ English and Digital for Girl's Education & Leadership Skills

British Council supported to educate 75 girls of 15-22 years in Hyderabad district for three months (February 2021 to April 2021) with English and Digital for Girls Education & Leadership Skills (EDGE). This included series of training by British Council training team and MDF. The project educated 75 girls in English and digital learning in Hyderabad district.



Health Projects

Save Child to Save Life - Ending Malnutrition

The project is supported by Accelerated Action Plan (AAP), Health Department, Government of Sindh (GoS) in district Hyderabad. The project initial period is from January 2020 to June 2022. The project intervention is to reduce stunting and malnutrition ratio among 0-59 month's children and pregnant and lactating women (PLWs), as well as to provide awareness regarding Infant & Young Child Feeding (IYCF), balance diet, immunization and vaccination and child health care in district Hyderabad, Sindh.

Case Study of Ramesh Popat: The project gained huge success and is making efforts to reach the entire population of uncovered area in the district of Hyderabad, where government hired lady health visitors (LHWs) are not covering local population. In this context the project was able to bring change in the lives of many mothers and children.

One of the inspiring story is of Ramesh Popat a 4 year's old victim of Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) due to poverty. When visited by the Community Health Work (CHW) in September 2021, his mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) was measured and it was 8.5 cm. Ramesh was referred to the Out Patient Therapeutic Program (OTP) where Ramesh remained under treatment and provided with Ready-to-Use Therapeutic Food (RUTF) dosage. Ramesh's health was transformed and when his MUAC was taken it improved to 12.5 cm in just two months' time. The project has more than 1,000 case studies of almost similar nature.



Provision of Iron Folic Acid and Deworming Tablets The project team has also provided IFA to 26,419 pregnant and lactating women (PLWs) so far. This is due to Iron deficiency and other complications that occur during delivery. In all 71,581 Adolescent Girls were also given IFA and in addition, they were also provided with deworming



tablets. Further project team provided deworming tablets to 50,876 children and 25,290 PLWs.

Community Awareness Sessions Project team conducted 10,284 awareness sessions on balance diet, importance and advantages of breastfeeding, importance of vaccination, mother care during pregnancy and child care during 0-59 months and use of lodized salt during 2021, through community health workers under "Hiring of NGOs for Service Delivery in District Hyderabad- Uncovered Area" project.







Prime Minister's Health Card Distribution and Awareness Dissemination

State Life Insurance Corporation of Pakistan through MDF, initiated the project in district Tharparkar under Prime Minister's *Sahaat Sahulat* Program from July 2019 to December 2021. The project has distributed 224,000 Prime Minister's Health Cards to the beneficiary families of district Tharparkar. The community mobilization campaigns were also carried out during the implementation phase of the project. Following activities were carried out in the project:



- Undertake campaigns in villages to increase awareness of the prime minister's national health insurance programme and its key features;
- Provide orientation to relevant stakeholders regarding the project benefits;
- Mobilize households in participating district for enrolment in the scheme and facilitating their enrolment and subsequent reenrolment as the case maybe;
- Advice to beneficiary households wishing to avail benefits covered under the scheme and facilitating their access to such services as needed;
- Conduct publicity campaigns in the district Tharparkar on basic performance indicators of the scheme;
- Assist for the grievance redressal mechanism developed by the State Life Insurance Corporation of Pakistan;
- Distribute health cards to the project beneficiaries; and
- Conduct validation of beneficiaries' data before uploading it on State Life online portal.

Women Rights

Inclusion of Women

Women Peace and Water Governance

The project was initiated with the support from Oxfam, first it was in district Hyderabad and later extended to include districts of Badin and Tando Muhammad Khan. The project started in April 2019 and ended in November 2020. The main focus of the project was to amend the "Sindh Water Management Ordinance 2002 (SWMO 2002)" as this ordinance did not have any women participation in it.

At the turn of 2021 the Amendment Act 2018 in SWMO 2002 got approval from Sindh Assembly which made it possible the inclusion of around 90,000 women in 45,000 Watercourse Associations (WCAs), Farmer Organization (FOs) and Canal Area Water Boards. Oxfam, Sindh Irrigation and Drainage Authority (SIDA) and MDF are now working together for the approval of Rules of Business (RoBs)



from Law Department, Government of Sindh and introduce the Watercourse Associations (WCAs), Farmer Organization (FOs) and Canal Area Water Boards (AWB) with new amendment and ensure the women participation at each level of water governance across Sindh.

Women Leadership in Public Life in Sindh, Pakistan

Oxfam and MDF in joint venture with the European Union from (EU) undertaking the project in Sanghar and **Sukkur districts of Sindh Province of Pakistan** from April 2020 to June 2022. The project comprises of research component, training need assessment, review of rights and laws, judicial review for protection of women rights, training delivery to Sindh Commission on the Status of Women (SCSW) and Women Development Department (WDD), Government of Sindh, officials, policy advocacy and reforms, inspection visits to women protection facilities. steering group for women coordination empowerment indicators.





committee formation, 24/7 helpline establishment, Model Women Protection Cell (WPC) at Sukkur, Friends of Women Empowerment (FWE) groups, training of Community Organization (COs) and Women Rights Organizations (WROs), selection of 8 Union Councils (UCs) in Sukkur & Sanghar districts, media engagement through docu-dramas and quarterly *khuli katchehri* (open forum discussions) and Information, Education and Communication (IEC) material for dissemination etc.

Low Cost Shelters

Low Cost Shelters for Marginalized Community of Sindh

The project is supported by the Benazir Housing Cell (BHC), Government of Sindh in below mentioned district from May 2020 to June 2022.

- 1. Construction of 126 Low Cost Housing Units in the district Tharparkar;
- 2. Construction of 121 Low Cost Housing Units in the district Umerkot; and
- 3. Construction of 56 Low Cost Housing Units in the district Shaheed Benazirabad.

In 2010, 2011, 2012 the people of Sindh have experienced catastrophes resulting in massive displacement and loss of assets as well as shelters placing victims in a dangerous situation. Even though the government along with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) has been assisted the communities for their survival but the consecutive floods have caused misery to the people of Sindh. Therefore, the present government, intends to provide housing services through BHC to the needy communities or those living in extreme vulnerability.











Staff Capacity Building

Humanitarian Response Capacity Development

MDF has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Concern Worldwide for the capacity building of MDF staff. The MoU intends to setting down the rules for cooperation and define an operational framework within which both parties collaborate with each as well as with the respective Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA) to work on agreed activities and action plans to augment disaster response capacity at local level. The overall goal is to develop and sustain both human resource and institutional capacity of the selected local Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) to enhance organizational capacity in humanitarian needs assessments, proposal development and smooth implementation of humanitarian program with improved accountability and internal controls. 

1 STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

The Management and Development Foundation (MDF) was established on 21 September 2010 and registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. It is established as non-profit organization. The basic purpose of the foundation is to improve the overall condition of health, education and living standard of people of rural areas.

2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

2.1 Accounting Convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and accrual basis of accounting except as otherwise disclosed in the accounting policies below.

2.2 Basis Of Preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the "Guideline For Accounting and Financial Reporting By Non-Government Organizations(NGOs)/Non-Profit Organizations (NPOs)" issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP).



2.3 Significant Accounting Estimates And Judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards as applicable in Pakistan requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgments about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised.

Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates in these financial statements relate to the useful life of depreciable assets. However, assumptions and judgments made by management in the application of accounting policies that have significant effect on the financial statements are not expected to result in material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the next year.

3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFCANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Income and Expenditure Recognition

Income is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the future economic benefits will flow to the organization and can be measured reliably.

Expenditures are recognized at the time of their occurrence

3.2 Fixed Assets

Operating fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided on a diminishing balance method at the rate mentioned in the relevant note. Depreciation on depreciable assets is commenced from the month the asset is available for use up to the date when the asset is disposed off.

Maintenance and repairs are charged to profit and loss account as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized and the assets so replaced, if any, are written off.

3.3 Impairment of Assets

The carrying amount of the Organization's assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to identify circumstances indicating concurrence of impairment loss or reversal of previous impairment losses. If any such indications exist, the recoverable amounts of such assets are estimated and impairment losses or reversal of impairment losses are recognized in the profit and loss account. Reversal of impairment loss is restricted to the original cost of the asset.

3.4 Fund receivables

Fund receivable are carried at agreed amount on the basis of real activities.

3.5 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and with banks.



3.6 Taxation

MDF is a not for profit organisation, therefore its total income is subject to one hundred percent credit of the total tax payable under section 100C of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

3.7 Other Payable

Liabilities for other payables are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received.

3.8 Offsetting

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet, if the Society has a legally enforceable right to setoff the recognised amounts and the Society intends to settle either on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.


